#### MESSAGE FROM PASTOR BRAD

#### At Least I'm Not...

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law." – Galatians 5:22-23, NIV

This month, in our journey through the Fruit of the Spirit, we get to look at goodness. I had a bit of a hard time tackling this one for two reasons. First, talking about kindness and goodness back to back, and it not sounding the same, was a worry of mine. Second, I didn't realize how general a word goodness was until I started thinking about how I use it and often say it. As you may expect, I turned to Scripture to see what it had to say about goodness throughout the Old and New Testaments and it has totally redefined and expanded what this word means. Personally, I often use variations of good and goodness as a vague synonym for nice or instead of the phrase, "That's nice". I couldn't think of a time in my life when I was so moved by an experience or anything that I would proclaim it as good or full of goodness. Ultimately, I, and I feel like many people, use the word good and its variations to describe a lack of bad or negative qualities more than any kind of exceptionally positive qualities.

Many of us consider ourselves good because we don't spend our time murdering, stealing, or generally causing pain or harm to the world around us. Where do you think God's bar is set on goodness? Do you think the kind of goodness Paul is talking about to the Galatians is simply a lack of evil or wrongdoing? A favorite passage of mine in Scripture even speaks to this issue. Midway through Luke 18 Jesus tells a parable about a tax collector and a Pharisee. We hear the Pharisee pray to God in Luke 18:11, "God, I thank you that I am not like

today. What this Pharisee is basically saying is that these people are bad, including this tax collector near him, and in his mind, he's not like them, so therefore he must be good. I've veered too close to that thinking too often in my life, have you? At the end of the parable Jesus uses the Pharisee as a lesson in what goodness is not and how we should claim it in our own lives.

That's what goodness is not, so what does the Bible say about what goodness from God is? Looking up where the word is used throughout Scripture reveals that God's goodness is often described as a state of being and a qualifier to a relationship or action. The goodness of the Lord is something asked for, that we are given, and experienced by people on Earth. That is a helpful thing to meditate on and look for in our walk with Christ, but I believe we can take the other usage and really use it as a means of spiritual growth. In Psalm 109:21 we hear this plea, "But you, Sovereign Lord, help me for your name's sake; out of the goodness of your love, deliver me" (NIV). This isn't simply an appeal to love, because love is a word and feeling that can be tied up in many things of the world and not of God. Luke 6:32 says, "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them" (NIV). It is God's goodness associated with His love that is being pleaded with in this passage.

This spiritual gift of goodness can be brought into the things we are already doing, especially that which we already consider good. Plenty of people do good things and have nothing to do with God, so goodness in the eyes of the Lord can't be only about doing the just care for the poor, do so out of the goodness of the Lord and letting the person know that's where it is coming from. Don't just give the thirsty a drink, give them a drink from your heart being full of God's love and pouring that

upon them also. How can you bring God into the things you do on a regular basis? The answers are countless, so be hopeful in knowing that we all have so many opportunities to pursue and live out the spiritual gift of goodness every week!

## OUR FINANCIAL HEALTH .....???

Well, we are two months into 2017, and I thought it would be productive to talk about where we stand financially.

Let me start out by saying, as I did in my last Dove article on finance, Millville is incredibly blessed by the generosity of our loving church family. Clearly, the Lord speaks to us as we seek His will for the vision and mission we embrace.

We ended 2016 on a positive note, with our worship giving exceeding our budgeted expenses by over \$8,000. Based on that, the finance committee believed that the trend would continue. The administrative council agreed to a 2017 budget that was slightly less than 2016, erring on the side of prudence. The committee was hopeful that some items that were eliminated could be restored as our situation improved.

Unfortunately, at the end of February, our worship giving is almost \$3,000 under budget, and our disbursements are almost \$2,000 over our worship giving receipts. Without going into the various reasons causing this situation, I would urge you do the following

- Pray for our church and church family, thanking the Lord for His many blessings, and asking for His guidance for the future.
- Join the ongoing effort to reach out to nearby communities, to make them aware of opportunities we offer for worship and fellowship.
- Consider your worship giving. Although we do not have a pledge campaign, consider

your giving as a pledge to the Lord, keeping up with your commitment, and where possible, increasing it.
