The pillars and great evangelists of our faith from Paul, John Wesley, Billy Graham, and so many others lived with an all-encompassing commitment to Christ and their testimonies and ministries continue to speak to it. People knew where they stood, how they lived, and followed them for it. That's within our reach! We can do that as individuals and a church! All it takes is prayer, preparation, listening, and then moving! Doing! We're not meant to fumble around and stumble into glorifying God. Revival Part 2

<u>What does the NT say about individual revival? –</u> <u>The Compromising Church</u>

Read Revelation 2:18-29.

The outstanding characteristic of Thyatira was the large number of trade guilds that flourished there. These trade guilds posed a special problem for the Christians of Thyatira. These guilds represented different trades in the city but they were much more than that, the guilds operated much as service clubs do today – the AARP, the Lions Club, and the Rotary Club - so their influence in the community was substantial.

The guilds often held common meals, which more often than not happened in a temple and would begin and end with a formal sacrifice to the various gods. The meat served during the meals would have been meat offered to one god or another. And if that wasn't bad enough the meals often became an excuse for excess and often degenerated into immorality.

There were two sides to this church. First there was the faithful Church. Christ, the author of this chapter, says: "I know your deeds, your love and faith, your service and perseverance" Christ praises this church for her works. This is a church that does good and righteous deeds. This is a church that looks after widows and orphans, that feeds the hungry, that gives water to the thirsty, clothes the naked, that cares for the sick, that visits the prisoners. It is a church with an open heart. Christ also points to the church's perseverance. This church patiently awaits the second coming of the Lord. The church of Thyatira has more deeds, more love and faith, more service and perseverance, than she had at first. There was progress in the life of this church. Yet there is another side to the church of Thyatira. It was a compromising Church. Praise

isn't all that the Lord gives to the church of Thyatira. Jesus says, "Nevertheless, I have this against you. You tolerate that woman Jezebel" We can safely assume that Jezebel is not the real name of the woman Jesus is speaking against. The name is symbolic of who teachings the church is following.

Details about the Biblical Jezebel are revealed in 1 Kings. She was the pagan daughter of a pagan king who introduced Baal's worship and Baal's prophets into the northern kingdom of Israel after she married King Ahab. Ahab was the seventh King of Israel. He reigned for 22 years from 871-852 BC.

Jezebel killed the prophets of the Lord; she tried to kill Elijah; she urged her husband to do evil in the eyes of the Lord. In marrying Jezebel Ahab compromised his religious principles. Ahab compromised in order to fit into the culture of his day. And as a result great evil was introduced into Israel.

The "Jezebel" of Thyatira introduced a foreign teaching into the church, a teaching of the religion of the current culture. She taught the teachings of the Nicolaitans. The Nicolaitans said it was permissible for Christians to participate in the pagan feasts, worship, and the sexual immorality of the common trade guild meals. These exact two things were specifically prohibited by the first church council of Jerusalem. Gentile converts had to abstain from these acts as spelled out in Acts Chapter 5.

Why did the church of Thyatira tolerate and even follow this evil woman and her teachings? The church made a compromise with the current religion of culture for the sake of security and prosperity. They want to be liked by the society they lived in. They made just a few "little" compromises here and there to gain acceptance in their society. Christ speaks boldly against any such compromises. He declares such compromises are fatal. There can be no compromise at all with the forces of darkness. Yet Jesus gave the Jezebel of Thyatira time to repent of her immorality. He said I have given her time to repent of her immorality, but she is unwilling. So I will cast her on a bed of suffering, and I will make those who commit adultery with her suffer intensely, unless they repent of her ways. I will strike her children dead. Then all the churches will know that I am he who searches hearts and minds, and I will repay each of you according to your deeds.

Always remember God does not tolerate any compromise with the forces of darkness. The church's mission is to be faithful to the Lord and is not to give itself away by compromising any part of what it believes.

So what does Jesus want the church of Thyatira to do? He says: "Only hold on to what you have until I come". "Hold on." Grasp. Seize. Don't let go. They are to hold onto His Biblical truths. He tells them to keep their grip on those Biblical truths. How do the believers of Thyatira do this? How do they maintain a pure Christian faith? How do they keep themselves from being defiled and tainted by the world? Jesus has only one answer: Read the Word, Read the Word, Read the Word. This is the only thing to do.

You don't need to become an expert in the cultural religions of the world to know they are wrong; you need only to know the Word of God. You don't need to bow before false gods; you need only to read the Word. You don't have to wonder about what is the right thing to do when the religion of culture confronts you; you need only to spend time with the Word. All that you have to do, the only thing to do, is to spend time with the Word.

We have our "Jezebels" today in the religion of our culture. Do you know what happens to today's Jezebel? She is put on TV. Her books are for sale on Amazon.com. She speaks at national religious conferences on being open-hearted. She is a guest on The View or the Steven Colbert Show. You will hear her messages spread by the media.

Next Jesus' call to the church of Thyatira promises blessing. He makes two promises to those who overcome, to those who don't bow before the altar of the religion of culture. The first promise is: "To him who overcomes and does my will to the end, I will give authority over the nations ... just as I have received authority from my Father". Remember, the Son of God is King. Jesus begins and ends His letter to Thyatira speaking of His rule, His reign, His Kingdom, His authority. Why is this important? Because someday the Kingdom of God will be the only kingdom that will exist and all God's enemies will be destroyed.

The second promise for overcomers is: "I will also give him the morning star." Jesus promises overcomers the gift of the bright morning star. The promise of the gift of the bright morning star is the gift of Jesus Himself. Overcomers will have Christ in all His fullness, all His glory, all His wisdom, all His power, all His majesty, all His grace, all His love protecting them. He will be with them and never leave them.

Christ's ends this call to the church of Thyatira with a final command: "He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches."

The biggest threat facing Christianity today is compromise with the religion of culture. Don't forget, it was the believers of God in Thyatira who were misled by Jezebel into compromising their faith. These servants of the Lord had deeds, love, faith, service, and perseverance and were growing in these. Yet they compromised with the world's culture of religion to fit in, to be accepted. For all around us today there are those who urge us to compromise and accommodate ourselves to our world's religion of culture. But once you start to compromise, where do you stop? Remember: revival comes from two sources. First there is the revival of the leaders of the church. The challenge for today's church leaders is the same as in Hezekiah's time. They are called to spiritual revival; a time to repent and return, a time rededicate themselves to the Lord and His Biblical truths based upon <u>separation, surrender,</u> <u>and sacrifice.</u>

Second there is the revival of individual believers. Personal revival can only come when we stop compromising with the religions of culture. Keep your grip on the truth of God's Word. Read the Word, follow the Word.

Remember Jesus' two promised blessings First, "To him who overcomes and does my will to the end, I will give authority over the nations ... just as I have received authority from my Father". Why is this important? Because someday the Kingdom of God will be the only kingdom that will exist and all God's enemies will be destroyed.

Second, "I will also give him the morning star. The gift of the bright morning star is Jesus promising Himself, supporting and protecting the overcomers. Why is this important? Jesus is King of Kings, if He is with us who can stand against us.

Jesus-Style Radical Hospitality

Matthew 7:1-2 "Do not judge others, and you will not be judged. For you will be treated as you treat other. In essence Jesus says, "You're welcome just as you are." Throughout His ministry, Jesus embraced despised prostitutes, cheating tax collectors, smelly fishermen, and all manner of sinners.

How To Recognize Radical Hospitality

Radical hospitality is: Authentically welcoming others and being glad to be with them. Caring curiosity - an interest in connecting. Being a friend even through it's not your "job." Accepting, no matter what. Profoundly relational the Bible commonly uses rational phrases like parent/child, branch/vine, sheep/shepherd. Something that takes time. Unnerving, surprising, and messy.

Radical Hospitality is not: Greeters at the door Meet-and-greet time in the service Coffee and doughnuts or an espresso bar Parking lot attendants A come-to-our deal event Bait and switch Guest book signing Awarding prize points for bringing visitors A strict list of "approved" stuff Scripted conversations.
